GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS



Required travel documents: Ecuadoreans

• Valid identification document (cédula de ciudadanía/ID) which confirms the Ecuadorean nationality.

Extranjeros o residentes

- Valid passport with minimum 6 months validity and the corresponding visa (visas apply to nationals from certain countries)
- CAN and MERCOSUR: valid passport and with minimum 6 months validity or and ID document.
- "Tarjeta Andina"

Keep in mind that the Ecuadorean Immigration officers can request a return ticket to confirm you do not overstay the permitted 90 days as a tourist.



Vaccines

For your security it is necessary to have had the yellow fever vaccine. This vaccine can be applied in the Ministry of Health centres, it is recommended you get this vaccine 10 days before travelling to highrisk areas, such as the Amazon. One dose offers immunity for life.



Medical Insurance

We recommend you have health insurance which can be used during your stay in the country, this will give you reassurance while travelling around Ecuador.



0% VAT rate

The services offered by tourist accommodation establishments to foreign tourists will have a 0% VAT rate, as long as the establishment:

- **1.** Is registered in the National Tourism Registry
- Has the 'Annual Sole Operation Licence' (Licencia Única Anual de Funcionamiento - LUAF)

A foreign tourist is considered to be any person from another country who stays in Ecuador for less than 90 days and who does not have temporary residence or permanence in the country.

For the application of the 0% VAT rate, tourist establishments must verify that, between the date of the service being provided and the last entry into the country, no more than 90 calendar days have elapsed.

Asset Entry Control

In compliance with the provisions of the "Organic Law on the Prevention, Detection and Eradication of the Crime of Money Laundering and Financing of Crimes", the traveller must detail in the Customs Registration Form (Formulario de Registro Aduanero), if he or she is carrying cash for an amount equal to or greater than ten thousand dollars of the United States of America (USD 10,000.00) or its equivalent in other currencies.

Air Freight Services

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CITIZEN SECURITY



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For emergencies:

- Remember that the emergency phoneline is 9-1-1. If you are traveling with a smartphone, install the free ECU 9-1-1 Integrated Security Service app to be attended to immediately.
 Dial 911 and report any emergencies or if you witness any wrongdoing.

Transport safety:

Ecuador has vehicles that provide public and private services. In the case of tourism, they are identified with a special permit issued by the National Transit Agency.

Remember, if you use the roads around Ecuador, you have free medical coverage in the case of a traffic accident.

If you are accessing the interprovincial public transport, we suggest going to the corresponding terminal to buy the ticket and access the transport.



Recommendations for taking a taxi:

 Request a taxi service at your accommodation or restaurant

If you are going to take a taxi on the street you should consider the following:

- The taxi must be yellow with an orange license plate
- It must display the registration number on the doors
- It must have a fare meter (taximeter). Ask the driver to activate it



• For interprovincial or intercantonal trips, take the transport



only at the official terminals of each city and points authorized by the competent authority

- If you send your luggage in the holds (below the bus), make sure you receive a ticket for it and when you arrive at your destination, always check that everything you brought is inside your luggage
- Before boarding the bus, check that the people who are going to provide you with the service are properly identified
- Always keep your valuables, wallet, cell phone and passport with you

Recomendación para viajar en auto rentado:

• Remember that the maximum speed limits in Ecuador are:

50 km per hour within the city 90 km per hour on perimeter roads and,

100 km per hour on highways

Avoid penalties and fines if you exceed these limits.



Banks, ATMs, cash:

- If you need to exchange money, you must do so exclusively in banks and authorized exchange houses
- If you go to the bank or ATM, if possible, go accompanied
- Use ATMs in public, well-lit places
- Do not accept help or company from unknown people
- Keep an eye on your personal

documents and cards when making a payment

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In protected natural areas:

- All Natural Protected Areas of Ecuador are free of charge, with the exception of the Galapagos National Park, USD 30 (thirty US dollars) for nationals and USD 200 (two hundred US dollars) for foreigners.
 - To visit the Protected Areas, you must do so through a Travel Agency and/or Tour Operator, which has guides accredited by the competent authorities

Other recommendations:

- Maintain frequent communication with your family and friends
- Always leave valuables in the hotel safe
- Be cautious when visiting crowded places or when going to bars or nightclubs; do not accept drinks from strangers or lose sight of your drinks
- If you require information, preferably request it at the hotel reception or from official tour operators or friends who reside at the destination you are visiting.



 If you like water sports, whether at sea or in rivers, do it with the support of a travel agency and/or tour operator, who has valid operating permits and authorizations

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

Recommendations in case of the occurrence of an adverse event:

EARTHQUAKE:

What to do before an earthquake?

 Consult your tourism service provider about evacuation routes and safety meeting points

What to do during an earthquake?

If it is inside a building:

- Stay calm
- Don't run
- Protect yourself by locating yourself under a table, desk, or bench. Another option to consider is under a door frame next to a solid column

 Stay away from exterior walls and windows

If you're outside or in an outdoor space:

Walking:

 Stay away from buildings, trees, posts, power and telephone lines, because they can fall and cause damage

Driving:

- Drive away from bridges or elevated roads
- Park your vehicle in an area out of harm's way
- Stay in your vehicle until the movement has passed

What to do after an earthquake?

Before returning to the tourist accommodation establishment:

- Check and confirm with those responsible for the tourist establishment that there is no damage to the structure of the building before entering
- Check for injured people and, if necessary, seek medical help
- Do not use elevators, be cautious with stairs
- Avoid stepping on or touching any dropped or loose cords
- Do not light matches, candles, open flame or electric appliances, until it is confirmed that there are no leaks or problems in the electrical or gas installation



Within the tourist accommodation establishment:

- Use the phone only to report an emergency
- If you have a radio, turn it on to stay informed and receive guidance
- When opening shelves or closets, do so carefully, because objects can fall out



VOLCANIC ERUPTION:

What to do before a volcanic eruption?

- Identify if the community you are going to visit is exposed to volcanic threats. Learn about the risks you may be exposed to
- Consult your tourism service provider about evacuation routes and safety meeting points

What to do during a volcanic eruption?

• Inquire from official sources about any alert changes

- In the event of a volcanic eruption, do not approach the volcano as lava flows or lahars may occur
- Close all doors and windows. Make sure you are not near them in case they break
- Go to the safety meeting points identified in the emergency plan provided by the authorities or the tourist establishment.
- Protect your eyes and mouth to prevent them from affecting your health due to the ash expelled from the volcano.
- Once you are in the safe place, contact your relatives to inform them of your health and those who accompany you
- Stay informed and only return to your accommodation establishment when the danger has passed or until authorities confirm that it is safe to do so





What to do after a volcanic eruption?

- Do not return to the accommodation establishment if the authorities have not declared the end of the emergency
- Avoid driving, it causes the ash to rise and affects the respiratory tract
- Abide by the safety rules set by the staff of the establishment

LANDSLIDES:

What to do before a landslide (mass movements)?

- If you are in a mountainous area, do not locate yourself near a ravine
- If you must evacuate, do so to the places that the authorities have defined as safe zones, if there are no defined areas, stay away from the course of rivers, estuaries and streams
- If the landslide is approaching and you cannot evacuate to a safe area, try to seek protection in the upper part of a building (upper floors of houses, roofs and buildings)
- If you are driving and you reach an area affected by the landslide, avoid crossing it and move away from the scene
- Stay away from the area affected by the landslide
- Find out from official sources about areas susceptible to landslides

What to do during a landslide (mass movements)?

- Stay calm
- DO NOT carry your belongings. You could lose valuable time to save your life and the lives of your loved ones
- In intense and prolonged rainy seasons, do not walk through the area that is set in motion, as it can unexpectedly collapse and wipe out everything

FLOODS

What to do during a flood?

- If possible, keep your belongings safe. However, remember that some floods come suddenly. In these cases, the most important thing is to protect your life, moving immediately to the safety zones
- Avoid crossing bridges where the level of the rivers has risen or travelling through flooded areas

WILDFIRE:

What to do during a wildfire?

- If you see fire or smoke in vegetation areas, please call 9-1-1.
- Act calmly and follow the instructions of the authorities and rescue teams



- Try to cover your mouth and nose with a damp cloth so you don't inhale the smoke
- Do not return to a fire area until the authority orders it; the fire can be reactivated

TSUNAMI

¿Qué hacer antes de un tsunami?

- Find out if your destination is in tsunami risk areas
- Inform and familiarize yourself with the evacuation routes to reach the safety zone easily and in the shortest time. Choose routes with moderate slopes, which allow you to gain height quickly.

What to do during a tsunami?

- If you are on the beach and feel a very strong tremor that prevents you from standing, move quickly to a previously identified safe place
- When there are no high places to protect yourself, look for a lush forest or the high floors of a building, as alternate safety sites
- A tsunami can penetrate a river or estuary several kilometres inland. Therefore, you should move away from rivers and estuaries and look for a high place
- Remember that, if the event is of close origin, the first wave can reach land in a few minutes.

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To fully enjoy your trip, keep these recommendations in mind:

- If you suffer from any illness, take any medication you will need during your trip
- The Public Health Service in the country is activated. In case of an emergency, or if you need personalised attention, you can go to the nearest Health Centre.
- On the Geosalud Web portal, the State Medical Network is available in a georeferenced way, look for the nearest one: https://geosalud.msp. gob.ec/
- If you have symptoms of respiratory diseases, wear a mask, especially in crowded places

To avoid other types of diseases, follow these recommendations:

- Wear protective clothing: long sleeves, long pants, especially at dusk and dawn to avoid mosquito bites
- In places with a high density of mosquitos, use mosquito nets or window screens
- Use mosquito repellent for your skin type
- Use sunscreen

ADVENTURE TOURISM OPERTATION/ ADVENTURE TOURISM

Ecuador has an adequate regulatory framework for Adventure Tourism. According to the Adventure Tourism Operational Regulations, adventure tourism modalities are classified based on the natural element in which they take place (land, water, and air).

It is recommended to hire operating agencies that have the valid tourism registry to carry out that specific activity. You can check if your agency is registered at the following link: https://servicios.turismo.gob.ec/ catastro-turistico/



Land

- Horse-riding
- Canopy
- Cycling tourism
- Climbing
- Cave exploration
- Mountaineering
- Hiking



Water

- Recreational modalities with the use of motorised boats (buoy, banana, parasailing and waterskiing),
- Scuba diving
- Sea/lake kayaking
- River kayaking
- Kite surfing
- Rafting
- Snorkelling
- Surfing



- Hang Gliders
- Canopy
- Paragliding

In order to carry out each of these modalities, the following indications must be taken into account:

- Recognise if you have the necessary physical capacity for each of the adventure modalities
- Hire a tour operator that has the tourism registry
- Require the use of adequate safety equipment
- The consumption of narcotic substances and alcohol is prohibited
- Use repellent and sunscreen in tropical and warm areas
- Wear the appropriate clothing for each type of adventure
- Bring hydrating drinks and other types of materials when the modality requires it, whenever requested in the tourist program to be carried out
- Inform the operator and the guides of allergies or pre-existing diseases
- Confirm that the guide has a first aid kit to attend to any emergency
- Always follow the instructions given by the professional
- Check with the tour operator, the schedules, climatic and geographical conditions, mandatory equipment, minimum age, number of guides or instructors necessary to carry out each type of adventure



- Consider the complexity of rivers in Ecuador, those of grade IV and V (4 and 5) are intended for professionals only
- Know in detail the contracted services, scope, coverage, terms and means of payment, exceptions, compensations, etc.



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


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
